


Follow up activity ideas for Matariki

Read/Watch the Story together

- Focus on the information about celebrating and use this to talk about other New Years celebrations around the world. What might your students do in their own culture?
- Talk about how you might celebrate Matariki with you own whanau.
- Discuss what knowledge you already have about the night sky e.g. star constellations or moon phases.

If you cannot cook together, you can also share ideas about what you would bring along to a Matariki feast. What are some special dishes that you love to eat with your whanau?


<u>Whakapapa:</u>
